

Tuition Assistance

In November 2010, St. Andrew's Catholic Church began a Tuition Assistance Program for St. Andrew's families who desire to send their children to Roanoke Catholic School, but who need financial assistance in order to do so. This program is funded by the generous donations of St. Andrew's parishioners who seek to strengthen our parish commitment to the vital ministry of providing a Catholic education for our youth.



In the fall of 2009, a committee formed to address tuition needs. Working with Father Miller and the Parish Council, the following members formally established the Tuition Assistance Program at St. Andrew's Catholic Church: Rich Joachim, Kevin Stokes, Ginny Garza, Manny Garza, Debbie Finnegan, Phil Buchy and David Burns.

The driving force behind the committee was one particular 2005 document from the United States Council of Catholic Bishops. This document charged the entire

Catholic community with responsibility for making available to its children a quality, affordable Catholic education.

Young people are a valued treasure and the future leaders of our Church. It is the responsibility of the entire Catholic community—bishops, priests, deacons, religious, and laity—to continue to strive towards the goal of making our Catholic elementary and secondary schools available, accessible, and affordable to all Catholic parents and their children, including those who are poor and middle class. All Catholics must join together in efforts to ensure that Catholic schools have administrators and teachers who are prepared to provide an exceptional educational experience for young people—one that is both truly Catholic and of the highest academic quality.*

In April 2011, Roanoke Catholic School awarded \$8,300 dollars in St. Andrew's Tuition Assistance to 22 St. Andrew's families, helping 37 students receive a Roanoke Catholic School education.

Last October, Pat Reidy with The Knights of Columbus Council 562 sponsored a Pancake Breakfast at St. Andrew's to help support the Tuition Assistance Program. This breakfast raised over \$1000 in support of the program!

This April, Roanoke Catholic School will award over \$17,000 dollars in St. Andrew's Tuition Assistance to St. Andrew's parishioners. This is absolutely wonderful. St. Andrew's has such generous parishioners!

Although this program has been able to help many families, there are still families who would love to send their children to Roanoke Catholic School, but cannot afford to do so. Alumni Profile

Chris Hoeser 44

When I was asked to interview an alumnus, I immediately assumed I would interview someone who had graduated fairly recently. When I met Chris Hoeser '44, however, I realized that he would give many people an entirely new perspective of Roanoke Catholic.

Mr. Hoeser, the son of immigrants from Munich, Germany, grew up in Vinton with his parents and brother. He joined RCS in 1st grade, and his family soon moved to Southeast Roanoke in order to be closer to school. Mr. Hoeser's mom

worked in the cafeteria, while Mr. Hoeser was active in the school community. As a member of the basketball team, he remembers being coached by Fr. Walter Sullivan. He enjoyed playing football and was also elected to the position of class president. After Mr. Hoeser graduated in 1944, he went to the Virginia Military Institute. Later, he started working at Norfolk and Western. Currently, Mr. Hoeser resides in Roanoke County.

Of course, Mr. Hoeser's RCS was extremely different from what current students experience. His class had seventeen people, seven of whom are still alive. When he attended RCS, tuition was \$2.50, paid at regular intervals throughout the year. During World War II, the school had limited sports and social activities. Mr. Hoeser remembers walking to school, as the school had only one bus. Additionally, as many alumni will remember, nuns taught the classes. Now, as Mr. Hoeser observed, the days of the nuns have passed. He says, however, that RCS has much stronger academics and prepares its students well for college. The students also have more opportunities to go on school trips.

One thing that has not changed about RCS, however, is the community. Mr. Hoeser clearly remembers the relationships students had with nuns, just as RCS students today have with their teachers. Contrary to what many people believe, he says, the nuns were not too strict. Mr. Hoeser remembers one nun, Sister Hilda, who made sure that all of the students knew the responses at Mass. Another nun, Sister Hugh Francis, was a favorite among the boys, as she was very beautiful. While Mr. Hoeser remembers the nuns as being disciplinarians, he says they were still willing to joke around. One year, when the circus was in town, two boys called in to say that they were sick. They happily spent that day at the circus and came to school the next day. After everyone was in the classroom, Mr. Hoeser says, the nun held up the day's newspaper. The newspaper, coincidentally, had a picture that had perfectly captured the moment when the two boys were entering the circus tent! Everyone had a good laugh, and the boys did not even get into any trouble. Mr. Hoeser says that all of the nuns had an impact on him, as they taught him many important life lessons.

Students, of course, were still mischievous. One day, in chemistry class, a student lit a box on fire. When one of the nuns saw it, she ran to stomp it out. After stomping it out, she realized that she had gotten white powder all over herself in the process! Mr. Hoeser laughed as he looked back on these moments and said that he really enjoyed the RCS community, along with the camaraderie. He truly enjoyed the dinner and dance at the Hotel Roanoke that was held before graduation, and he proudly remembers receiving his diploma.

Mr. Hoeser said that his time and education at RCS greatly benefitted him. His education gave him the opportunity to go to college, and the religious education was the basis for his spiritual life. He would not change a thing about his time at RCS, which he fondly remembers. When asked for what advice he would give to current students, Mr. Hoeser replied, "Do the best you can, all the time."

Looking Back

Roanoke Catholic's first state title, in any competitive sport, was claimed by the 1970 Chess Club.

High school is full of excitement and challenges: growing up from adolescence into young adults, forging relationships, pursuing academia, preparing for college, and dreaming about our future. But along the way you just may be fortunate to experience one extraordinary event that is undeniably life changing. This is my story.

My name is Jim Potter, class of 1970. Roanoke Catholic was my fourth (and final) high school. During my first day as a junior in September 1968 I was introduced to the numerous benefits of RCH that included a myriad of extracurricular activities, such as the Chess Club.

"Do you play chess?" inquired my animated classmate, Tony Laster. "I'm the captain of the Chess Club and we have our first meeting after school this week."

Since I knew the basic moves of the game, I showed up with new friend and classmate, Mike Attalla, who was eager to play. I was annihilated within 15 moves! I proceeded to play freshman Mark Shelor and the results were worse! Tony offered me a game but I knew I was dead meat before I could make my first move. I don't think I was a bad a chess player. My new friends had more skills and talent. They understood strategy and foresight, visualizing multiple moves, options, and variations. Simply, they were disciplined and had experience.

Over the weeks and coming months, Mark and Mike took me under their wings by introducing me to chess books for study, giving me a monthly subscription to *Chess Life*, and encouraging me to join the Roanoke Valley Chess Club located on Memorial Avenue, a few doors away and a turn of the corner from the Grandin Theater. For me, chess morphed from a social, carefree game to a serious tournament sport pouring out hours of mental strategy against an opponent over a board dotted with rooks, knights, pawns, and queens.

The following May of 1969, the Roanoke Catholic chess team participated in the Virginia State High School Championship hosted by the University of Virginia. Though I attended and played, I was not part of the four-man team that contributed to the teams' overall tally because I hadn't earned the rank. RCH placed second in the tournament, losing the title by half a point! Out in the parking lot I told my friends, "I want to come back next year and be part of the four-man team and win the state title." Tony, Mike, and Mark were equally committed, so the following year would prove to be a "mission possible" in our youthful lives. I had to qualify for the fourth seat by playing against the top contender vying for the same coveted position beginning the following school year. And I had the entire summer to prepare.

My friend Mark spent countless hours at my home during the summer of 1969. We played chess endlessly into the wee hours of the morning. Though I won only one game from him, I was improving. Pilgrimages every Friday night to the Chess Club became the weekly activity where all of us could gather catching up on the latest, honing our skills playing tournaments and studying aspects of openings, the middle, and end game strategies. Once school reconvened in September, Tony arranged the game that determined who would claim the fourth board. I was

eager, ready, and fortunate, winning the seat well into my opponent's end game. My senior year was much more chess active than the prior year, as Tony arranged after school tournaments with Patrick Henry, Cave Spring, Andrew Lewis, William Byrd, and Jefferson High. RCH won every tournament, as the "front four" never lost an individual match. Now we were ready to return to Charlottesville in May 1970. And we were on a mission.

We arrived in Charlottesville late Friday afternoon, May 8, to an unexpected development. There was a martial law presence everywhere in and around UVA. National Guard, State and local police, and college security were on high alert status. You see, the prior Monday, May 4, was the Kent State shootings and the entire country was protesting and demonstrating its outrage. So here were four high school kids stepping into a Twilight Zone episode, a surreal atmosphere that was so combustible, one emotional spark could have ignited a mass riot! We were informed by the State Police that going to and from the tournament hall would have to be in groups of two and spaced no closer than 10 steps apart or, if caught violating this edict, we would be thrown in jail. With all this said, we did not lose our perspective or intense focus of competing against the other high schools.

After one of the strangest but highly exciting weekends of my life, our mission was accomplished. Roanoke Catholic captured its first state title in any competitive sport! In fact, our three point victory was a landslide in the chess world. But because of the sport's anonymity, our victory went virtually unnoticed, earning a paltry three sentence paragraph write up in the Roanoke Times juxtapose to the Obituary page! This was two years before Bobby Fischer beat Boris Spassky in Reykjavik, Iceland, for the World Chess Championship, earning Fischer his photo on the magazine cover of Sports Illustrated and Sportsman of the Year. In retrospect, the year leading up to our state title was a "perfect" year. I couldn't write a script that could top what life brought us. Because of space limitation, I have left out a year's worth of experiences that could easily fill a novel. Now there's an idea!

She asked her husband, Blair, to construct a beautiful treasure chest to attach to her classroom door welcoming the students with the message, "Receive the treasures that the Lord has given us!"

When Mrs. Campbell moved to Roanoke, she found that the Lord continues to share the treasures of the Catholic Church. On Campbell Avenue, she located the Catholic Historical Museum of the Roanoke Valley filled with records of all kinds, sepia-toned photos, and artifacts more interesting and beautiful than she ever imagined.

Wouldn't you love to hear the history behind the gorgeous parasol hanging from the ceiling? Wouldn't you like to count or compare the many crucifixes, statues. and pictures of the Saints? Did you ever wonder where the original Baptistery from St. Andrew's is located? Did you ever want to identify a relative, student or teacher from long ago? Would you like to glimpse the royal-looking attire once worn by priests? Are you curious about the boys who lived in the orphanage? These answers and artifacts are but a few of the many treasures tucked away in the little museum downtown, and there is even a gift shop!

Nick Centrone, President of the Catholic Historical Museum of the Roanoke Valley, cordially welcomes visitors to the treasure chest. A member of the Virginia Museum Association, CHM houses artifacts donated by local churches and parishioners in the hope of keeping our rich history alive. The Monstrance, originally used at Our Lady of Nazareth Church,







is a wonderful example. Approximately 20 inches tall and embellished with amethysts, it represents a prime example of the museum's commitment to preserving our heritage. The museum hopes to further convey its purpose and presence in the Roanoke Valley. As community outreach, CHM offers a presentation by member John Wagner, who is available to speak to area groups detailing the Catholic Historical Museum organization and the museum's contents. The quarterly publication of the newsletter of the Catholic Historical Museum presents museum members with not only museum news, accessions, and needs, but also highlights of events in local parishes and Catholic organizations. Mr. Centrone emphasizes that the CHM is supported by membership and donations as it continues to cherish and protect our past and save the treasures that we have as we share them with others. Academics



I have heard it said, "If you build it they will come," and I believe that is true. When Principal and Head of School Patrick Patterson decided to add a dance program to the renaissance program at our school last year, I happily accepted the Director of Dance position. I have been dancing for as long as I can remember; it seems like my mom put tap shoes on my feet and directed me to a stage as soon as I could walk. I enjoy movement and love sharing my passion for dance with others.



We have established that there is a need for the dance program in our school, and the program has grown since we started last year, with enrollment growth at 85%. Dance classes are currently held in a classroom with tile floors, so imagine the difference a sprung dance floor, mirrors, barres, and sound system would make for the children. Having additional funds to further develop the program would create an atmosphere of creativity, life-long passion, and learning.

Our long-term goal is to build a Performing Arts School. I want to create a climate where children will thrive and become our future leaders and entertainers. Some children are "drowning in their inadequacies" and dance can be one thing that can help them develop a

sense of worth. I know we can make a difference.

Considering our current economic situation locally and throughout the world, we need assistance. Knowing our strengths and weaknesses helps us to develop a better, stronger program. I know that all things are possible with God, so first I am requesting prayer. I want the dance program to become what God wants it to be, nothing more, but nothing less. I am also requesting financial support, so we can physically develop an appropriate dance space.

If you cannot afford to give or do not feel led to give financially, we would still appreciate your presence. The dancers perform annually at Our Lady of the Valley and at the Lower School Talent Show. I am so proud of the students and would love for others to see what they have accomplished. The dance program reaches the students, parents, teachers, and beyond. Some RCS teachers and parents have even joined our ranks in the finale of the talent show.

To build a dance studio in an existing classroom would require a dance floor (\$2,500-\$10,000), mirrors (\$1,000 to cover one wall), barres (\$300), and a sound system (\$500-\$3,000). I hope you will consider making a taxdeductable donation to the dance program at Roanoke Catholic School. We have applied for a grant from Taubman Sustainability Grants, and I believe we will be more likely to receive financial assistance from them if they see that we started fundraising at home. 

The Wrestling Program Celebrates Another Successful Year



The RCS Wrestling Team completed a 20-5 dual record this year. Of these matches, the wrestlers' conference record with private schools in the Virginia Independent Conference was 7-1. (Out-of-conference competitions with public schools were 13-4.) The school's program produced 6 All-State Wrestlers, 5 Catholic State Champions, and 1 National Prep Qualifier for Lehigh University. Five RCS wrestlers fought their way to the VIC Championship Round and 1 took the VIC Championship! The team also won 2 public school tournaments and placed 2nd and 3rd at 3 other public school tournaments. They finished the season with the Virginia Independent Schools Division III State Championship, also

finishing 7 out of 32 for all divisions at the state tournament. In other words, the RCS Wrestlers not only beat all of the Division III teams, but outscored all of the Division II teams and acquired 7th place overall in the VISAA (state) tournament.

The Celtics also won the Commonwealth Catholic State Championship held at Benedictine High School in Richmond. The team finished 2nd at the Virginia Independent Conference Championship, behind then-number-1 in the state, Liberty Christian Academy. The coaching program was voted "Coach of the Year" from three different organizations: Roanoke Middle School Coaches, Virginia Independent Conference Coaches, and the Virginia Independent Schools Athletic Association Coaches.

The program currently wrestles in the old lower school cafeteria, which was converted to a program area. The program has been influenced by coaches associated with USA Wrestling and the fine people at the Virginia Tech Wrestling Program. Since its beginning in 2000, the team has been guided by Coach Dave Burns and Coach Robin Leonard.

Swim Team Makes a Big Splash

The RCS Swim team had a phenomenal season this year. Not only was Coach Tudor named coach of the year by the Virginia Independent Conference, but the VIC Swimmers of the Year were Shane Tudor '12 and Kylie Patrick '15. Five of our swimmers made the VIC Men's All-Conference team: Shane Tudor, Sal Russo '12, Keith Clark '12, Michael Craddock '15, and Steven Rosendahl '13. Equally, five of our Celtic ladies made the VIC Women's All-Conference team: Kylie Patrick, Reagan Johnson '13, Hannah Tudor '14, Alicia Iott '12, and Katie Brajdic '12. Some of our swimmers qualified to swim against others from up and down the east coast in the Eastern Zone Sectional swim meet.

Michael Craddock swam 200 meter breast stroke at the Eastern Zone Sectional Meet and achieved NCSA Junior National Cut, which means that he has qualified for a national swim meet this August in California. Shane Tudor swam at Eastern Zone qualified for the finals in 100 meter free style and swam his best time in the 100 meter butterfly. He will be swimming for George Mason in the fall.

Sal Russo qualified to attend USA Junior NCSA swim meet this year and was only half a second off from making the finals to swim for the Olympic time trial cut. His relay team in the 200 meter medley placed 17th out of 80 teams. During the five-day meet Sal had qualified to swim for four of those days. He will attend Mars Hill College in the fall.

Girls Varsity Basketball

With a sophomore being the oldest player, RCS fields a young varsity team; however, they had a great year. The girls finished 5th in the Blue Ridge Conference, and they also made it to the state playoffs as a 10 seed. Their over-all record was 23-10 and their district record was 8-5. The following girls made the Blue Ridge All Conference Team: Catherin Cullum '15, Olivia Clark '16, and Gabby McClelland '16.



New Era in Celtic Boys Basketball Begins

The 2011-12 Roanoke Catholic boys basketball season was an adventure in challenges and adjustments. With this school year's new direction in both mission and athletic thrust, RCS boys' basketball moved toward recapturing the glory of Catholic hoops history, back to the days of "Pete" Wiggins, Bob "Boomer" Ayersman, and the hard-nosed, everyday student-athlete who earned Catholic athletics respect.



With those changes, some student-athletes chose to transfer to other schools in order to achieve their goals, leaving the basketball program with only 2 varsity players. As a result, RCS played an abbreviated varsity schedule of 8 games by merging our 2 seniors with the junior varsity team. Our purpose was to allow seniors Sam Gerstemeier and Sam Silek to complete their high school basketball careers without losing the privilege of representing Roanoke Catholic as seniors. The team played a 29 game schedule, playing 8 varsity games and 21 junior varsity games.

Versus varsity competition, the Celtics were 4-4. Against junior varsity competition, the team record was 10-11, ending the season with a 14-15 overall record. The JV team lost in the finals of the Virginia Independent Conference (VIC) Junior Varsity championship game to Virginia Episcopal School.

Highlights of the season were upset wins over both Liberty Christian Academy and Virginia Episcopal School at the end of the season. The team's improvement was evident in the way players complemented one another in outstanding wins over some of the best teams in the VIC.

Though the team will lose its seniors, next year's varsity team will play a full schedule with a young, but experienced team. If all return, the Celtic varsity will consist of 7 juniors, 3 sophomores, 1 freshman, and 2 eighth graders. We are excited about the future of Roanoke Catholic basketball. 
