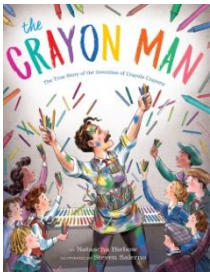
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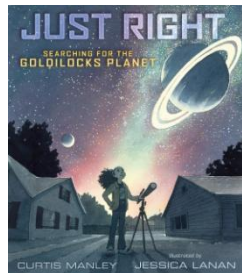
16 Words — This is the story of the American poet William Carlos Williams and how being mindful can result in the creation of a great poem like “The Red Wheelbarrow.”



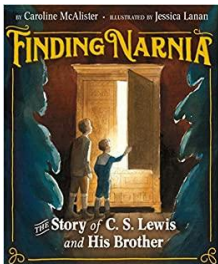

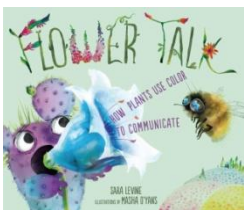
Just Right – Follow a young girl as she explores questions about the wondrous search for another Goldilocks planet: a planet outside of our solar system that can support life.



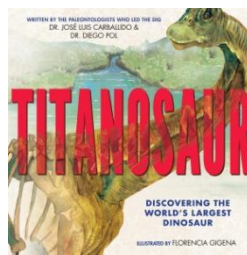

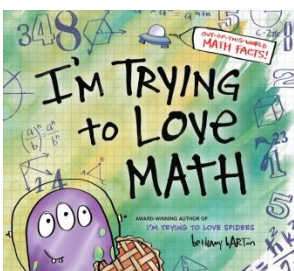
